A Mosque is Coming to Canora

Turkish Canadian Society (TCS), owner of the old Canora School building, is getting ready to break ground for a religious assembly building on the northwest corner of their property located at 15450 105 Avenue this spring. Established in 1976, Turkish Canadian Society is the oldest and largest community organization serving the Turkish Canadian community in Edmonton. TCS purchased the surplus school site from EPSB in 2002. After a few dormant years, the location has been quite active in recent years. The existing site is currently host to the Whitehall Daycare in addition the Sil Lum Kung Fu, and is bustling with activities organized by the Turkish Canadian Society.

Design and development work for the planned mosque started about three years ago. TCS was able to secure a development permit in 2018. Once initial conditions in the development permit were met, the City of Edmonton issued the building permit for the project in January 2020. TCS has established a special website to provide information about the project: www.turcanora.ca

In preparation of the construction and the day-to-day operations of the future mosque, a separate, independent non-profit organization has been established under the name of Blue Mosque Foundation – Diyanet Edmonton (BMF). BMF will be in charge of all the fundraising and will oversee the construction process. TCS President Ahmet Topal said that they have chosen the name "Blue Mosque"

for the project partly to honour the famous Blue Mosque situated across from the Hagia Sophia, a popular tourist destination in Istanbul, in addition to the beautiful blue dome planned inside the building.

The mosque's name is not the only interesting detail about the planned project. Suat Demirer, the project consultant who lead the project design team, stated that he was inspired by the common story of Genesis in

Islam, Christianity, and Judaism. In all three major religions, the holy books talk about how God created the universe in six days (and rested on the 7th day). Considering we are also on Treaty 6 land here in Edmonton, Mr. Demirer hid several combination of sixes in his design - 198 of them to be exact. Once construction is complete, TCS and BMF officials hope that the Blue Mosque will be a place to build empathy and understanding between

people from all religions. They are even planning a special prize, a trip to Turkey, to the first person who can identify all 198 combination of sixes. TCS President Ahmet Topal urges all community members to follow the progress of the project at www.turcanora.ca, provide feedback, and, of course, if they can afford to do so, to donate to the project.

I am excited to contribute to our new publication. SPANN (Stony Plain Road & Area News Network) is the result of a number of conversations, as well as plans to reconnect with communities. We benefit from much of the previous work done with the former publication, SPURR. We also benefit from the labour of a number of people who previously worked towards a better Jasper Place

It's appropriate that this new publication comes together with a renewed commitment to community development, with several new players and people with a strong history of this part of Edmonton. I would like to thank Diane Kereluk (my predecessor), Jamie Post (Glenwood Community League), and Jason Klinck (City of Edmonton/ Jasper Place Revitalization) for starting a dialogue about a revival of a community-based newspaper for our area - the beginnings of what

has become SPANN. Huge thanks to the City of Edmonton through Neighbourhood Revitalization and the Jasper Place Revitalization Strategy for their support of resources for this pilot year.

SPANN is one of the many changes for the Stony Plain Road & Area Business Improvement Area over the coming months. I am excited about what we have in the works. Place-building and community development are large components of what BIAs do. Much of this is grounded on a brand, including ideas and thoughts we associate with a business area. Stony Plain Road & Area BIA has engaged with a communications firm to help move us through a branding process. This will be a cornerstone of how we work, as well as the programs, services, and events we produce. It will be a new opportunity for your BIA to begin branding our business area, and to align with strategies that will support and encourage business and communities to congregate. It will afford our area to support existing businesses and to attract new businesses that want a well-connected, walkable area with affordable rents and space to grow their businesses. SPANN and other communication platforms will create opportunities for dialogue around our activities to support communities over the next year.

The Board of Directors and I have been working on strategies and goals for the coming year. In our proposed plan for 2020, we are building new approaches and structures to create positive branding of Stony Plain Road & Area, and to create opportunities to bring increased traffic and customers to this area. These strategies will have goals focused around:

- increasing human-scale positive interactions at street level;
- increasing perception of safety and security;
- empowering business members and owners in being agents of positive change;

- increasing the positive perceptions of our BIA and attract more businesses to locate to the area;

Jasper Place Revitalization Update

Hello Jasper Place. My name is Jason and I'm the City of Edmonton's Revitalization Coordinator for the four neighbourhoods of Jasper Place: Canora, Glenwood, West Jasper Place/Sherwood, and Britannia-Youngstown.

In Revitalization, we support the development of a community vision and plan, through working together with local citizens, businesses, and agencies. This could involve building connections between people, increasing safety, promoting the local economy, and beautifying the neighbourhood.

The Revitalization program began in Jasper Place back in 2008. Since then, many improvements have been made to the community, especially to its infrastructure. This included the street-scaping of Stony Plain Road, building of plazas on 152 Street, and the purchase of the Orange Hub from Grant MacEwan. Most recently, after a two-year community engagement, Butler Park has been redesigned and construction will begin this spring.

In early 2019, a new Stakeholders Committee was struck to begin planning a new phase for Jasper Place with more focus on how people are connected to one another. The group has members from community, agencies, and businesses, and identified three priority areas to start:

- Engaging more people to get involved.
- Building more ways to communicate what's going on.
- Activating places within our community. Since then, several projects have begun to fulfill these directions. Thirteen community projects alone were funded through Matching Funds by Revitalization in 2019 across eight different community organizations. Here is a sample of some of them that were completed last year or are beginning in 2020:

- Community Connections Project trained eight local community residents to engage more than 100 residents in Jasper Place, and built an asset map of individual and collective strengths.
- SPANN community newspaper you're reading it! This project refreshed the former SPURR publication as a way to let people know what's going on, get critical information out, and feature positive stories about the people of Jasper Place.
- Community Space exploring opportunities to activate and transform open spaces at the Orange Hub into community living rooms, and to use vacant lots along Stony Plain Road for community gardens.
- Events Kids on Track hosted several youth leadership projects and events (Mother's Day, Thanksgiving, Christmas dinner, and puppet show). Jasper Place Wellness Centre hosted the Big Picture and Holly Jolly Christmas.

- The Canora Park Watch held five events at St. Anne Park, and the Stony Plain Road Business Association hosted the Storefront Cinema.
- Walls of Colour a mural project that will include Filipino, Syrian, and Latin communities.
- International Kitchen collective cooking where each month one community member or business shares and cooks their recipe with the group.
- Jasper Place History Project documenting the untold stories of Jasper Place as a "migrant city."

There has been a lot of progress made and much more to come. We are always looking for more participation from the community through projects, committee, and ideas, so please contact me if you'd like to be involved at jason.klinck@edmonton.ca

Cumming's Corner: Greetings From Your Federal Member of Parliament

Dear constituents,

I wanted to take advantage of SPANN's first issue to introduce myself, as I don't think that I got to meet all of you over these past few months. I am James Cumming, your federal Member of Parliament and my job first and foremost is to represent your voice in Ottawa in the House of Commons. You might have gotten my constituency mail-outs in your postal boxes, so you may already have a clue as to who I am. Not all MPs use these, but I like their broad reach and they allow me to receive feedback from constituents,

so please feel free to send me comments through their attached forms.

One of my added roles is to represent and support small businesses across the country as Conservative Shadow Minister for Small Businesses, and Export Promotion. So, if you are an entrepreneur having issues with competitiveness, productivity, access to markets and so on, please don't hesitate to contact me about it. I truly am grateful to have this responsibility but ultimately my duty is to my constituents.

Another exciting development is that I get to sit on the Parliamentary Finance Committee so we are very much looking forward to analyzing the 2020 Federal Budget coming up (which, by pub-lication date, might already be out), and I encourage you all to browse it, as federal provisions affect us all to some degree.

This winter, to top it all off, I also was lucky to be able to introduce a Private Member's Bill (PMB) in the House of Commons, and I decided in favour of an important topic for our local economy – namely fighting for our resource sector, and Alberta's economic potential. My bill, C-229, asks the federal government to repeal the previously passed C-48, the West Coast shipping ban. While it has been called by

some as grandstanding, I see it as doing everything in my power as an Opposition MP to stand up for our economic development and access to markets, and I will not apologize for it.

If you have any questions about my PMB, what Finance committee is doing, or need any help with federal departments (whether CRA, Immigration Canada, Veterans' Affairs, etc.) please do not hesitate to reach out to my office or me. I am grateful to be your Member of Parliament.

From Your MLA: Edmonton Riverview

Congratulations to SPANN on your inaugural issue! I am so grateful for the opportunity to connect with readers. A big shout out to community members of Glenwood, West Jasper Place, and Sherwood. These areas are in the provincial constituency of Edmonton-Riverview, which I have the honour to represent.

Lots has happened on the provincial front over the past year. We have experienced significant job losses along with cuts to public programs. Many Albertans are concerned about the challenging economic times and decreasing supports available. I share your concerns. The NDP Caucus continues to fight for diversification in our economy and strong public programs. We

know our reliance on the oil and gas industry makes us vulnerable to price shocks.

In early March, the price of West Texas Intermediate plummeted. This means lower royalties for our provincial coffers without a cushion as we are still so reliant on this industry. At times like these, this government needs to step up and stimulate the economy as industry doesn't have the resources to do so. Investing in a robust capital plan creates jobs for workers that have been laid off. However, we are seeing our provincial government restrict spending and lay off thousands of workers. This is only making a bad situation worse. Additionally, the public programs we count on are experiencing budget reductions. Less supports in our schools, hospitals, and communities are the new normal. It does not need

to be this way. All governments have choices. The current government is choosing to support wealthy corporations with their \$4.7 billion tax give-away, instead of supporting regular Albertans. You deserve better! Our NDP caucus is fighting for what matters to you!

My constituency office is located on 149th Street and 92 Avenue, just south of the Stony Plain Road Revitalization area. From Your MLA: Edmonton Glenora

I want to thank you for electing me once again to serve the Canora and Britannia Youngstown neighbourhoods as the MLA for Edmonton-Glenora. It's an honour to have earned your trust, and I promise to work hard to ensure your voices are heard in Alberta's Legislature.

Alberta's economy is in trouble. As of March, our province has lost 46,000 full-time jobs since Jason Kenney and the UCP government chose to give a \$4.7B handout to profitable corporations. They have cancelled programs and investments that helped create 30,000 jobs, and Albertans are being hit with a cruel budget full of cuts to vital public services, including several that Jason Kenney specifically promised he wouldn't make.

Budget 2020 breaks Jason Kenney's campaign

promise to protect frontline healthcare by cutting hospitals, diagnostic scans, public health, and senior's drug benefits. This budget cuts \$135 million from hospitals, and directs resources away from family doctors to pad the profits of private surgical clinics. The government has launched an attack on family medicine that doctors say will profoundly impact primary care. This budget is also a continued attack on seniors; this government is cutting \$72 million from the senior's drug plan by kicking 60,000 Albertans off the plan and considering new out-of-pocket costs on those who remain. This government is ushering in American-style health care and creating chaos in our system.

Jason Kenney and the UCP promised to protect education, but their 2019 budget cut \$136M from school districts. The 2020-21 Government Estimates also show a \$118M cut to the education system (p. 79). This means larger class sizes and less support for students with special needs. Parents are also getting hit with hundreds of dollars in unexpected school fees.

These are just a few of the ways that working families are paying for this government's \$4.7 billion corporate handout.

Hearing your concerns is a critical part of working together to make our province stronger. I will continue to work for you to make sure all Albertans have the means to live and support their families with dignity, to maintain your access to quality public healthcare and education, and to support local businesses in a diversified economy.

City Administration has presented the highly anticipated City Plan Report. The City Plan combines a Municipal Development Plan and Transportation Master Plan, that includes strategic direction in environmental, social and economic planning. The goal of the City Plan is to shape how Edmonton will look with a population of 2 million people.

Over time and as change accelerates, the needs of Edmontonians will change. An inclusive, agile and adaptive City Plan allows us to respond meaningfully to emerging realities. The City Plan offers a cohesive strategy for residents, business owners, property owners, City administration and community organizations to navigate future growth. It will also provide direction for plans, guidelines, inform proposed changes, prioritize resource allocation and measure progress.

The policy structure for the City Plan is as follows:

Strategic Goals

- 1. Healthy City
- 2. Urban Places
- 3. Regional Prosperity
- 4. Climate Resilience

Guiding Values:

- 1. I want to belong and contribute
- 2. I want to live in a place that feels like home
- 3. I want opportunities to thrive
- 4. I want more access within my city
- 5. I want to preserve what matters most
- 6. I want to be able to create and innovate

Five Big City Moves

- 1. Greener As We Grow is about creating a city dedicated to protecting the environment
- 2. Rebuildable City is about working with what we have today and adapting our built environment to meet future needs
- 3. Community of Communities is about building connections to welcome new residents and developing accessible housing, recreation and employment centres.
 - 4. Inclusive and Compassionate is human-

centred design where people of all ages, backgrounds and abilities can thrive.

5. Catalyze and Converge is about developing new physical and economic opportunities for ideas, talent and investment.

For most of us, it may be difficult to think about a city of 2 million or the year 2065. However, that is exactly what our City Plan is challenging us to do: to look beyond where we currently are and to build on it to service future generations. Residents can use the City Plan to see where Edmonton is headed and be informed about ideas designed to strengthen their communities.

Ward Boundary Commission

The Ward Boundary Commission's mandate is to comprehensively evaluate the existing ward structure and make subsequent recommendations to City Council.

The Ward Boundary Commission is a temporary Committee of Council.

This Commission, the first in the City's history, will undertake a review of Edmonton's current electoral ward boundaries, comprehensively evaluating the existing ward structure and making subsequent recommendations to City Council. The number of wards is not within the scope of the Commission's work and will remain at 12.

In addition, the Commission will review Council's existing Ward Boundary Design Policy C469A and provide recommendations to guide future ward boundary amendments.

The Commission will be comprised of Edmonton residents who represent a number of perspectives in related fields, including political science, public policy, and urban planning. The City's Returning Officer (the City Clerk) will be an ex officio non-voting member of the Commission, responsible for providing advice and administrative support.

The Commission will be disbanded and Ward Boundary Commission Bylaw will be repealed following either the submission of the required report and recommendations, or by June 1, 2020, whichever occurs first.

The Ward Boundary Commission performs these functions:

- Reviews the existing Ward Boundary Bylaw
- Reviews Council's Ward Boundary Design Policy, C469A
- Consults with all Councillors and each school board operating in the City
- Conducts public engagement sessions
- Provides a written report to Council with recommendations regarding new boundaries without increasing or decreasing the number of wards, including a summary of feedback gathered
- Provides a written report to Council with recommendations regarding the criteria and procedure for future ward boundary amendments, including a summary of feedback gathered
- Ward Boundary Commission meetings are open for members of the public to attend. The Commission and board administration are finalizing the future meeting schedule.

Food4Good: Addressing Food Security

Food4Good is the food security division of the Jasper Place Wellness Centre. Our Food4Good initiative has been working to address important issues of food insecurity, food access, and community wellness in the Stony Plain Road area since 2013. We of-fer programs in the areas of growing, cooking, food access, and education. Here's a snapshot of some of our food projects:

Our Low-Cost Markets happen every second Wednesday from 11 a.m.-1 p.m. at Sal-vage Reclaimed Furniture (15308 Stony Plain Road). We sell fresh fruits, vegetables, eggs, and often bread at affordable prices. Through bulk buying and healthy food dona-tions, we can offer fresh foods to our community at 30-50% lower than grocery store prices. We distribute around 1000 lbs of food per market and try to source as many cul-turally-appropriate foods as possible. Anyone is welcome to attend and our main goal is to increase access to nutritious food.

We run a "Meal Prep 101" class on the second Tuesday of each month from 11 a.m.-1 p.m. in the kitchen at West End Christian Reformed Church (10015 149 Street). Partici-pants learn the basics of meal planning, prepping, and putting together meal options on a budget. Each session we make one grain, two veggies, one protein, and one sauce that people can mix and match into different meal combinations at home. Everyone takes home multiple servings of each category for \$5 per person.

Our Kid's Kitchen is a monthly cooking club run at the Boys & Girls Club West (16030 104 Avenue). Elementary students learn kitchen skills, healthy eating habits, and how much fun cooking is! We prepare a nutritious meal together which the kids either serve to their peers for dinner at the Club or bring home to their families.

We have supported the creation of 50+ community garden beds in our neighbourhoods since 2013. The gardens are places for community members to connect with each other and their food. We have worked with multiple churches in

the west end to put unused space to work, and also match gardeners with neighbours who have open space in their yards. Our group of gardeners is 40+ strong and come from diverse backgrounds: some are long-time area residents, newcomers to Canada, youth, seniors, experienced gar-deners wanting to share their knowledge, and first-time growers wanting to learn.

We have many other projects and new initiatives on the go. Visit us at Jasper Place Wellness Centre or at food4good.ca to learn more!

There's nothing like a steaming bowl of pho on a cold winter day, and in the west end, Co Do Hue is generally my go-to stop for soup. Portions are large, with lots of noodles and meat, the broth is rich and flavourful, and a bowl will set you back only a little over \$12.

Co Do Hue, which has two other locations much further north, is also one of my favourite places for vermicelli bowls. The grilled meat is absolutely incredible – so tender and full of flavour. Beef and chicken are my standard choices, while one of my frequent dining companions enjoys the grilled pork.

On an unseasonably warm February evening, I visited Co Do Hue after running some errands in the area. Instead of pho, I ordered another of my menu favourites: grilled chicken on fried rice. It's great for the days I am super hungry, because the portion is huge. Two large chicken thighs are pounded down thin and grilled to tender perfection. The mountain of fried rice has only egg in it (no vegetables) and is not greasy at all. At almost \$15, it's the most expensive entree on the menu (along with its counterpart, grilled beef on fried rice).

My dining companion, who also

usually orders pho or a vermicelli bowl, decided to try the deep fried chicken leg on fried rice for the first

time. The chicken had a light coat-

ing and was very crispy, although it was cut up into small pieces (including the bone) which he said made it awkward to eat. He also thought the

leg itself was rather thin. While he thought the chicken tasted great, he plans to order something else next time.

We also got an order of green onion cakes to start. Fried golden brown, with just the right amount of salt and green onions, they go well with any meal at Co Do Hue. Finally, what would dinner at a Vietnamese restaurant be without some iced coffee? The metal espresso strainers dripping the precious into glasses of condensed milk were brought to us right away, so that the contents were ready to stir and pour into the second glasses containing ice as soon as our meals were brought to the table.

Service at Co Do Hue is always friendly. You order by number at the front counter, and then wait for your meal to be served to your table. It can get very busy during the lunch hour, for good reason. Co Do Hue is easily one of the best Vietnamese restaurants in the west end.

Co Do Hue is open from 11 a.m. - 8 p.m. and is closed on Tuesdays.

Jasper Place Community History Project: Your Stories Wanted

Remember... When the trees were seedlings? When Jasper Place was its own town? The Muk Luk Mardi Gras? When people drove from Edmonton to shop in the evening?

Ground Zero Productions is just getting started on a community history project. Jasper Place is rich in history. From the beginning, the neighbourhoods that make up the area have welcomed all kinds of people. We've heard about "bumper riding" on the side streets – the dangerous sport of hanging on to the back of a car and sliding on your snowboots - and about the country bars on Stony Plain Road, the last place in Edmonton where a live band could work six nights a week. We want to hear your stories.

We aim to create a community collection of oral history interviews, videos, and photos of the people who have lived in Jasper Place. We will be gathering the Indigenous stories, the stories of the first settlers, and of people who just arrived and remember their first impressions of their new home. These parts of our history will be documented, archived, and shared back with the community.

Ground Zero is based in the Orange Hub. We hope this project will help to connect people in the neighbourhood to the building that used to house the MacEwan School for the Arts. The collection will be displayed in part at the Hub and we will have events there to show it to the community. The full collection will be on our website. Finally, everything will be donated to the Provincial Archives of Alberta, so people all around Alberta can know more about Jasper Place. In the past, we've worked with people in Mill Woods and Northeast Edmonton to collect their stories and

shared them in variety of ways. We created Video Ballads in collaboration with singer-songwriter Maria Dunn, like GWG: Piece by Piece, and Packingtown about the NE Edmonton meat packing plants.

We want the community to have access to its own stories and have pride in the neighbourhood. We think a big part of revitalization is knowing what came before and sharing our history. What bridges us all together? What can we learn from each other?

Tracking Progress on Valley Line West LRT

The Valley Line West LRT is an urban-style transit line and will connect with Edmonton's overall mass transit system providing access all over the city as we shift how we work, travel and enjoy our rapidly growing and evolving city. You've likely already seen the signs of progress as we move closer to LRT service becoming a reality in west Edmonton.

The 14-kilometre Valley Line West will run from Downtown Edmonton to Lewis Farms and includes 12 street-level stops and two elevated stations at West Edmonton Mall and the Misericordia Hospital. In the Stony Plain Road business area there are three stops: Grovenor Stop at 142 Street and Stony Plain Road, Stony Plain Road Stop at 149 Street, and Jasper Place Stop at 156 Street just south of Stony Plain Road. Each will provide transit users an easy and efficient way to visit this hub, where they can shop, eat, and enjoy local amenities.

The Valley Line West is fully funded and recently launched its procurement, which is the competitive process the City uses to find a contractor to design, build, and provide partial financing for the project. The

successful contractor will be selected by December 2020 and construction of the project is expected to be completed by 2027.

But you've probably already seen construction work all along the

LRT route. These early works help prepare for full construction in the future, and involve major projects like relocating the complex network of underground utilities away from future LRT infrastructure. Most of this work has already been completed in the Stony Plain Road business area, but there will be some projects happening in 2020. The City will also remove five buildings from the area to make room for LRT infrastruc ture and landscaping. We work hard to minimize impacts, but you can expect some disruptions in your area as the City prepares for this important and transformative public transit project to break ground next year.

Poverty: No Single Cause

Poverty is a complex issue. It's not about bad personal choices. It can be systemic or sudden, a turn of fortune, or a generational cycle. "Not only did they help me find a place to live, but they even stocked my cupboards once I moved in. I now have my own bed and no longer need to worry about where my next meal will come from!" she shared.

Poverty isn't just about not making ends meet - it takes many forms and results in a loss of self-esteem,

Jasper Place Leisure Centre Re-Opens

The Jasper Place Leisure Centre (9200 163rd Street) re-opened on February 17th after three years of being closed for rehabilitation. Most of the work done in the 50 year-old building was "back of house" in order to keep the facility operating. Unforeseen circumstances kept the building from reopening longer than originally anticipated.

Here is a list of all of the building's improvements, some of which are immediately visible to patrons, while others are behind the scenes:

- Refreshed lobby including accessible front counter service.
- Addition of barrier free washroom in lobby.
- New salt water pool experience.
- Refreshed steam room and teach pool with waterfall feature.
- Addition of an inclusive change room with barrier free washrooms/change room.
- Additional lockers.
- Refreshed male and female change rooms.
- Stair access to the water slide and 5M platform to increase use.
- New viewing area.
- Additional parking stalls in the front.
- New art mural installation.
- Replaced the pool deck drainage system.
- Replaced windows.
- Replaced ceiling in the natatorium (the building containing the pool).
- Completed structural and waterproofing repairs.
- Public safety improvements.

- Removal of hazardous materials repairs to the building structure.
- Upgrades to the pool sanitary and circulation system.
- A new boiler and ventilation system.
- New power, gas, water and telephone service connections.
- Upgrades to the plumbing fixtures in the change rooms.
- All new piping to the sanitary system underground.
- Compliance to Alberta Health Services Anti-Entrapment requirements for public safety.
