

United Way of the Alberta Capital Region

United Way of the Alberta Capital Region has run the Coats for Kids & Families initiative since 1992. But this year is different, with many in our community continuing to feel the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic. Because of this, United Way is seeing an increased need from local agencies for warm winter coats, boots, and accessories for families in need in the Edmonton region.

"Many people lost their job because of COVID, and they can't afford winter clothing," shared Cherif Diallo of the *FRAP Society* (Francophonie Albertaine Plurielle). Sadly, his many clients are in greater need due to the pandemic. Cherif shares how many people come to Canada in search of a better life, but it is often harder than they anticipated. They can need a helping hand to be successful. Yet, there aren't enough resources to go around.

This year, FRAP has supported 75 families immigrating from poverty-stricken African countries to our community. "These families are very high needs," says Diallo. "The winter clothing that we have to offer right now is not enough for everyone."

Canadians Being Kind

Many local families don't have the means to purchase the clothing needed for Alberta's harsh winters. For almost 30 years, United Way's Coats for Kids & Families program has been there to keep our community warm. The FRAP Society is just one of 32 partner Donation Depots that help us distribute donated winter items. Last year, Coats for Kids and Families provided 5,020 donated coats to people living in low-income throughout our region.

That level of impact would not be possible without many people coming together to do local good every winter - people like Pranav Jha, a student at the University of Alberta.

"Being locked up during the pandemic gave me time to reflect on what kind of life I wanted to manifest for myself. I realized that I wanted to make service an integral component of my daily life. Fortunately, I had a lot of like-minded friends who were keen to join me in the project," reflected Pranav. As a result of this reflection, he collected over 120 warm winter items for families in need. Pranav is just one of the hundreds of contributors who make this program possible every year. And those contributions are making a big difference.

"When families receive winter clothing, it builds more trust and is very symbolic for them," said Cherif. "They say that people in Canada are very kind and helpful."

This spirit of helping each other is demonstrated by no one more than our long-term partner, Page The Cleaner. Page was established in Edmonton in 1935, and this family-run business has supported Coats for Kids and Families since its inception. Over the years, Page has cleaned over one hundred thousand coats that deserving local kids and families have received through participating United Way community service agencies. I felt we had a great autumn in Edmonton as we survived without much snow staying down until after Halloween and now, in December, we are starting to get some lower temperatures. As we start hibernating in the winter months, I hope that you plan to enjoy the fresh, crisp air and take in some winter activities. SPR is so close to several walking routes, our river valley, and the ravine access. After living with this pandemic for some time, getting out and letting the wind blow through you is a great mental and physical release. For us to best enjoy the outside we need safe access to sidewalks and pathways, so please do what you can to keep sidewalks clear of ice and snow as residents and businesses of our community. With so many communities intersecting Stony Plain Road, we really want to support and promote walking and rolling – depending on your abilities.

I am sure that many of you have also noticed some work being done along Stony Plain Road and I want to let you know that the SPR Business Association is doing what we can to communicate and support the best possible transition over the next five years with the West Valley Line LRT development. In this issue there is information for you to keep track of the construction and on-going developments with both the City of Edmonton and Marigold Infrastructures in terms of updates as well as email and phone lines for both entities. As you may have noticed, the lit-up trees along SPR are being removed to make way for road and sidewalk construction. This work will begin this spring between 156 Street to the bridge over Groat Road on SPR. This work will be done by Marigold and will start along 156 Street and move east-ward. This will result with all street parking along SPR ending by late winter and a reduction in sections along SPR to one-lane of traffic in each direction for at least three years. We will be working with Marigold and The City of Edmonton regarding signs and wayfinding strategies to ensure that customers and visitors coming to SPR have clear access on where best to park and navigate services and business visits. You will also read in this issue that there will be a new daily ETS bus service added to SPR that will travel from Jasper Place Transit Station to Unity Square in a low barrier shuttle bus.

I would also like to take this opportunity to share with you that SPR BIA is doing work to plan some new tree lighting in areas around Stony Plain Road including some side streets and west of 156 Street, in the next two years to enhance decorative lighting, placemaking and beautification. We are excited about these initiatives as it will ensure all people have places to visit and to enjoy the positive assets of our communities with enhanced security.

As your Business Improvement Area we are here to help with community and business development and we are open to partnerships that help to promote and enhance engagement within our area and with our businesses, residents and agencies. ETS to Provide Bus Service Along Stony Plain Road

To supplement service along Stony Plain Road during Valley Line West construction, ETS will be providing bus service along Stony Plain Road starting November 29th between Jasper Place Transit Centre and Unity

Square at 116 Street and 104 Avenue.

To accommodate a wide, diverse range of users, a DATS bus with a DATS Operator (with DATS markings removed) will be used for the shuttle. To start, the shuttle will run every 60 minutes, seven days a week to provide reliable and consistent temporary service. Riders are encouraged to still use routes on 102 Avenue, 107 Avenue, 116 Street and 142 Street to accommodate seniors and those with mobility needs to access the shuttle.

After hearing from residents about the previous gap in service, I am happy to see this solution be brought forward. This shuttle is a working improvement supported by the feedback of transit riders and residents who are being directly impacted by this service change.

Westend Seniors Activity Centre Offers Classes to Keep Seniors Busy All Winter Long!

With the arrival of winter, many of us picture Alberta's seniors, hunkering down for a long cold winter but that simply isn't the case. "Last week's rainfall showed us once again how resilient our members are," said Dr. Haidong Liang, Executive Director of the Westend Seniors Activity Centre (WSAC). "Many of our staff were caught in traffic but two of our wonderful volunteers showed up for their regular shift, ready to greet our members as they arrived for their classes!".

This is just another example of how members of the Westend Seniors Activity Centre and seniors across Alberta have dispelled stereotypes often associated with Alberta's aging population. "When the pandemic arrived in March 2020, we had to start offering our classes online. To date, we have taught over 800 seniors how to use Zoom. This has been fantastic because some of our members are not comfortable with returning to our centre, so they are continuing to do their weekly classes online." said Cherisse Macayan, Assistant Manager of Programs at WSAC. We are very excited about our Winter Program schedule for 2022 because we are continuing to offer both in person classes at our centre and online classes to seniors across Edmonton.

very affordable. Our annual membership is \$30.00 and a 7-week chair yoga class is \$56.00." said Macayan. "We are currently offering over 100 classes and drop-in activities for our Winter session and we have fitness and yoga classes for all fitness levels. All of our instructors have many years of experience teaching older adults so they are easily able to adapt their classes to provide different levels of instruction." added Macayan.

"When we created our fitness and yoga class schedule, it was important that we offered classes for those older adults who have mobility issues," added Liang. "Many adults are able to do fitness classes but they may feel more comfortable doing their exercises from a chair. Also, some seniors are unable to get down on the ground. By offering gentle and chair fitness classes, these seniors are able to stay fit and strong" said Liang.

When asked about other programs being offered by his centre, Liang pointed out that they offer more than just fitness classes. "We have partnered with the Y.M.C.A. to offer a free tech series at our centre to help seniors be safe online and teach them other things like how to buy a computer or a cell phone. We also have our Toonie Talk series that we host each week. These are educational sessions open to the public and you don't have to be a member of our centre to attend. We have some fantastic guest speakers who talk on a variety of topics such as wills, downsizing, seniors benefits, and other topics that seniors and their families want help with. The guest speakers are local businesses that are helping seniors on a daily basis so they are a wealth of information."

When asked what the first step should be for someone interested in learning more about the classes and programs being offered at his centre, Liang suggested a visit to their website *www.weseniors.ca.* "Our website shows all of the in-person and online classes we will be offering this winter. Each class has a very detailed description so seniors can read about the class, see the fitness level it is geared toward and find something that interests them. If they are not sure, they can contact our centre and our Programs Team will work with them to find a class they can attend".

Liang even had a suggestion as we get closer to the holidays. "Christmas is right around the corner. If your readers are looking for a fun Christmas gift for the older adult in their life we can help. For \$85.00 they can buy a gift certificate that includes a membership for 2022 and a credit towards one of our classes!"

Spiced to Perfection: *Guru Restaurant & Bar Brings Modern Dining to Traditional Cuisine*

Indian cuisine is a staple for many when comfort food comes to mind, especially as a go-to take out option. Guru Restaurant & Bar on Stony Plain Road is taking it up a notch and has transformed Indian cuisine to an incredible standard of modern fine dining.

With two locations in Edmonton (one on the West end and the other in Downtown's ICE District – each featuring a different menu), this contemporary restaurant concept features elevated versions of beloved Indian dishes. The West end location, featured in this review, is a welcome escape from the cold Edmonton winter. As soon as you pass through the entrance underneath their glowing orange sign, you are immersed into a welcoming environment that looks and feels incredibly upscale.

The décor, especially the warm oranges and brown tones throughout (featuring incredibly comfortable seating) set the tone for the delectable flavours you're about to experience. As a party of three, none of us had been to Guru before, so we were excited to try multiple menu options to get a taste of their offerings.

To kick off the meal, we opted for some refreshing drinks (I went with the Fire & Ice), and two orders of the Butter Chicken Samosas to share; these are more than enough for 2-4 people! They are large samosas bursting with Guru's signature butter chicken recipe. For those concerned about spice level, these are very mild (and very filling!).

Going into the main course, our waitress was very helpful with recommendations and let us know that

almost all of their main dishes are designed for sharing (but can easily be eaten for one if that is more your style). Because we already had a taste of the Butter Chicken, we were all ready to sample more of the menu!

All entrée dishes are served alone, and rice or naan bread can be ordered separately if you wish. I opted for

the Mango Chicken, which was creamy and delicious. The mango sauce (that also has coconut) isn't overpowering, it just adds a rich depth of flavour to the chicken. Our group also ordered a basket of naan bread to share, which was the ideal size for 2-4 people.

My friends each ordered an entrée



also – one opted for the "Dhaba" Lamb Curry, and the other opted for the Fish Moilee. To top it all off, we also ordered the Coastal Aloo Gobi (a vegetarian cauliflower dish). We gave everything a taste and it was all absolutely great. The authentic flavours and bold spices really come through in each dish, and everything was cooked perfectly.

We had plenty left to take home – and it tasted just as delicious the next day! Whether you visit Guru for dine-in or take out, you won't be disappointed with their top-tier service, flavours, drinks, and authenticity. If Indian food is familiar to you, or if you're new to this cuisine, you will find something here that pleases your taste buds.

Proudly Constructing the Valley Line West LRT

Marigold Infrastructure Partners selected by City of Edmonton to build rail line

The City of Edmonton selected Marigold Infrastructure Partners (Marigold) to design and build the 14-kilometre Valley Line West LRT project from downtown to Lewis Farms. Construction began earlier this year and will take five to six years to complete.

Marigold is committed to be a good neighbour and to working with Edmontonians through the process to build a rail line that will better connect the city for generations to come. Expansions in Edmonton's LRT network improve livability and change how we move and grow into a city of two-million people in the coming decades.

Some of our work you may have seen in your neighbourhood includes the mobilization of laydown areas which are secure storage areas for construction materials, equipment, work trailers and crew vehicles. These areas will remain laydown areas for the remainder of the project. The other scope of work visible in the neighbourhood was tree removals.

While construction in the Stony Plain Road

(SPR) Business Association area was limited in 2021, we've been working closely with the association to address current questions and mitigate future concerns. This was done through:

- The SPR Business Association Annual General Meeting
- An onsite meeting with representatives from the SPR Business Association and City of Edmonton
- Citizen Working Group meetings

While you may not be familiar with Marigold just yet, we're working hard behind the scenes. Over the last year, our team focused on:

- completing detailed design work
- setting the stage for upcoming construction work
- introducing ourselves to residents and businesses
- completing renderings for stops and stations
- launching Marigold's website and social media channels

• supporting a site monitoring program with Indigenous communities at Lewis Farms

While construction will ramp up in 2022, you may have noticed some construction work related to the LRT which includes:

- drilling and preliminary construction work on the elevated guideway along 87 Avenue near West Edmonton Mall and the Misericordia Hospital
- construction preparatory work including stripping and grading, utility relocations and tree removals
- demolition of the West Edmonton Mall Transit Centre

We understand the work we are undertaking can be disruptive and cause inconvenience and we appreciate your patience. We are committed sharing project updates and invite you to follow our progress and connect with our team related to construction activities via our project website, our social media channels, or by reaching out to us via telephone or email.

Identifying Scam Emails

This doesn't happen every day so it was natural to be shocked when

the news broke some days ago about the fake emails coming from a verified FBI email address (*https://www*. cnn.com/2021/11/13/ politics/fbi-fake-emails*cyber-threat/index. html*). Yes, as in the United States Federal Bureau of Investigation. It was a classic case of the hunter becoming

hunted. Perhaps that's not so uncommon nowadays though with many scam schemes going around, scammers will only keep getting smarter and perhaps bolder. This is not the first time this has happened, but this time, it was much cleaner and much more

difficult to identify that it was a fake email. If the bureau had not issued a statement denying the emails, it could have passed for a well-intended email from the FBI.

With the spate of these scam emails (arguably the highest scam avenue these days), the most

important protection tool is to know how to identify scam emails and avoid falling prey. If we can't stop them, we can at least protect

ourselves from falling victim. Below are some indications that an email is most likely a scam email:

- i. Email comes from an unfamiliar mailing address: Be careful when you just get an email from an email address you have not had interactions with in the past. For example, an email from a vendor saying you have won some gifts without first transacting business with them to qualify for the gift.
- ii. Mailing address is different from the body of the email: This is like getting an email from shoe.com talking about bag.com.
- iii. Error in mailing address and email body: This is always a star indicator. It's either one letter

is missing from the supposed vendor's name or some letters are juxtaposed to make it look like the real vendor.

- iv. There's a request to click on a link: While this is not always an indication of a scam email, you need to be careful about clicking on any links at all these days.
- v. There is an urgency in the email tone: Scammers usually want to play on your ability to act quickly without much thinking. So, beware when an email is given unreasonable timelines such as within 24 hours to act on an email.

While the list is not exhaustive, this will definitely save you some trouble with scam emails.

Good News Alberta. Albertans will now finally be able to enjoy the benefits of initiatives to make childcare be affordable to everyone.

Too many families in Canada lack access to affordable, inclusive, and high-quality child care. This is an economic issue as much as it is a social one. Without access to child care. parents – especially women – cannot fully participate in the economy, and the global COVID-19 pandemic has brought these issues to the forefront. As part of our commitment to support a recovery that brings all Canadians along, the Government of Canada wants to ensure that quality and affordable regulated child care spaces are available to all families who need it.

Locally, International Center of Early Learners and Development Inc. spearheaded and campaigned heavily on making this goal a

reality. Minister of Tourism and Deputy Finance Minister Hon. Randy Boissonnault together with Deputy Minister and Finance Minister Chrystia Freeland advocated on this matter during their last visit in Edmonton.

The Childcare Network

The Prime Minister, Justin Trudeau, highlighted that Budget 2022 sets a goal of on average \$10 a day child care within the next five years. By building an early learning and child care system, we will make life more affordable for Canadian families, create new jobs, grow the middle class, increase women's participation in the workforce, and drive strong economic growth across the country.

The federal government will work with provincial, territorial, and Indigenous partners to build this Canada-wide, community-based early learning and child care system. The government will invest \$30 billion over the next five years, with a minimum of \$9.2 billion per year ongoing. By the end of 2022, this new

system would reduce fees for parents with children in regulated child care by 50 per cent on average, everywhere outside of Ouebec. The Government of Canada will also work with provinces and territories to help ensure that early childhood educators are provided with the training and development opportunities needed to support their growth and the growth of a child care system that works for all Canadians.

This investment builds on the work the government has been doing to make life more affordable for families and give children the best start in life. Programs like the Canada Child Benefit, which puts money directly in the pockets of parents to help with the added expenses of raising a family, have already been supporting those who need it the most. However, with child care expenses running nearly as high as rent or mortgage payments in some cities across the country, we know that more needs to be done.

The Return of Storefront Cinema

From October 7 to 12, 2021, the Stony Plain Road Business Association held their Storefront Cinema event! Storefront Cinema promotes the idea of walkability in the area and encourages guests to get out in the community while supporting local art. During this week-long event, short videos provided by FAVA - the Film & Video Arts Society of Alberta, for the Got a Minute Film Festival, were shown at three locations around the Stony Plain Road area. These locations included 110B 300 West Block Drive NW, 15501 Stony Plain Road NW, and 10025 167 Street NW. The event used the windows of these vacant spaces as areas to project the silent one-minute films, which looped every 30 minutes. This project brought together the community of West Edmonton, safely, for a unique viewing experience. It also allowed residents an opportunity to explore and become reacquainted with Stony Plain Road. In the past,

the event was more of a social activity, however with COVID-19 protocols in place, 2021's Storefront Cinema was a more laid-back activity where viewers visited on their own time in their own cohorts. The Stony Plain Road Business Association looks forward to continuing to hold Storefront Cinema and can't wait to start the planning for 2022!

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

Remember... what your first winter in Jasper Place was like? When the trees were seedlings? When Jasper Place was its own town? The muddy streets, taking the Diamond Bus line to Edmonton? The lumber mills? Going to the teen dances at the Jasper Place Sports Centre during Muk Luk Mardi Gras? Planting a vegetable garden? Working in a community organization or business in Jasper Place? The corner stores where you went to get pop and candy after school?

Throughout the pandemic, Ground Zero Productions has been quietly gathering information for this community history project, and we have discovered that Jasper Place is rich in history. From the beginning, the neighbourhoods that make up the area have welcomed all kinds of people. We've heard about a time when Jasper Place felt like a "town-camp" with many Metis and First Nations people, how a young Edmontontrained hairdresser who had immigrated from Trinidad-Tobago was able to set up her first business in Jasper Place, and how the 70s and 80s rock bars and the Country bars on Stony Plain Road were the last places in Edmonton where a live band could work six nights a week. We want to hear your stories too.

We are creating a Community Collection of oral history interviews, videos and photos of the people who have lived in Jasper Place. We will be gathering the Indigenous stories, the stories of the descendants of the first settlers, and of people who have more recently arrived. We also want the stories of people who made their livelihoods and homes in JP. These parts of our history will be documented, archived and shared back with the community via our website.

Ground Zero is based in the Orange Hub. We hope this project will help to connect people in the neighbourhood to the building that used to house the MacEwan School for the Arts. The Collection will be displayed in part at the Hub and we will have events to show the Collection to the community. The full collection will be on our website. Finally, the Collection will be donated to the Provincial Archives of Alberta, so people all around Alberta can know more about Jasper Place.

We want the community to have access to its own stories and have pride in the neighbourhood. We think a big part of revitalization is knowing what came before and sharing our history. What bridges us all together? What can we learn from each other?

Stony Plain Road Shuttle Service

City of Edmonton

Starting November 29, ETS will provide bus service on Stony Plain Road between Jasper Place Transit Centre and Unity Square at 116 Street and 104 Avenue. To start, a shuttle (a DATS vehicle with DATS markings removed) will run every 60 minutes, seven days a week and provide consistent, reliable temporary service for riders during Valley Line West construction. Due to limited seating on the shuttle, transit riders, who are able, are asked to use routes on 102 Avenue, 107 Avenue, 116 Street and 142 Street so that seniors and those with mobility needs can access the shuttle.

Transit riders are appreciated for their patience and understanding, and can share their thoughts about what is working and what can be improved at *edmonton.ca/BusNetworkFeedback*.

Return to Full Service

in April. A portion of Route 519 is being adjusted to better serve residents in communities adjacent to Ellerslie Road and 66 Street. This change will provide better coverage and reduce walking distances for those accessing neighbourhoods along these roads. Route 111 is also being adjusted to provide improved access to the Kingsway Mall entrance from both directions.

Riders can expect a return to regular routings

for several bus routes traveling on Jasper Avenue now that construction detours have ended. Route 701, which connects the Kingsway/Royal Alex and Southgate transit centres, also returns to its regular routing with work on the Duggan Bridge on Saskatchewan Drive completed.

Transit riders plan their trips using the thirdparty Transit app, Google Maps, *edmonton.ca/ transit* or by calling 311.



As part of the regular winter service changes this year, ETS will resume full service on all routes starting on Sunday, November 29. ETS is thankful for transit riders' patience as bus schedules were temporarily adjusted in early November due to workforce availability and vaccine policy requirements. The health and safety of staff and riders are a top priority and ETS continues to take the steps necessary to keep riders safe and the services they rely on running as smoothly and safely as possible.

Notable Route Adjustments

Several routes and schedules are adjusted to meet typical ridership changes throughout the year, as well as feedback gathered from transit riders since the implementation of the bus network redesign


