Located just north of the northwest corner of 149th street and Stony Plain Road, Apache Seeds Limited is a gardening destination (indoors and out) for customers throughout the Edmonton area. Founded in the spring of 1958 in the Town of Jasper Place, original owners Frank Close and Leonard Vigneau offered a variety of tools and items acquired through a buyout of inventory from a local general store. In 1964, the business moved to its present location into a new, larger, building that included an engine repair shop. Frank and Len experimented with different products and services including: manufacturing sweeping compound, repairing windows, sharpening ice

skates, and selling Skidoos. In the end, gardening reigned supreme and the garden centre has been flourishing ever since.

Further changes came in the 70's and 80's including the expansion of the parking lot and increasing the retail space with the purchase and renovation of the building next door. During the 90's, a greenhouse was built and warehouse space was consolidated onto the current site. The 1960's building still carries reminders of its long history including the original sign post advertising hardware and paint, shop counters that have been used for years and the antique scales that are still in use today. Apache Seeds is now owned and run by Frank's son, Jerry, and is a trusted location to find seeds and bulbs, tropical plants,

nursery stock, tools, and decor. The store stocks a variety of colourful pots, soils and fertilizers, and in the winter months, snow shovels and ice melt.

Open year 'round, Apache Seeds is an in-town resource, close to the community. The staff provides reliable information and will do their best to recommend and source the products that you need as well as advising against unnecessary purchases. They will go so far as to suggest alternative suppliers such as Calade Orchids and Tropicals located on 159th Street and Stony Plain Road. Working in tandem with neighbours promotes community! This dedication to customer service has resulted in many second and third generation gardeners who trust the name and staff of Apache Seeds.

Retail and commercial customers

With a foundation of 65 years, Apache continues to maintain small business values and services: Treating folks on a first name basis, working with customers to find solutions, and donating to fundraisers in the community, all while being a local and friendly source of knowledge and expertise. In our previous article, we explored the walkability of Jasper Place prior to its amalgamation with Edmonton. However, many residents in Jasper Place also depended upon existing transit service in Edmonton, prior to amalgamation. Historically, the Edmonton Radial Railway extended its streetcar service in 1913 along 102 Avenue to 142 Street. When this became too expensive to maintain, service up to 149 Street was taken on by Edmonton's first municipally operated bus route in 1932 1.

However, the Edmonton Radial Railway expanded its trolley bus service, eventually replacing the bus route with an electrified trolley bus line in 1949, with Jasper Place commuters making their connection at the bus loop at 102 Avenue and 147 Street, the most western point of the trolley line.

Despite a growing community, Jasper Place did not have a bus line of its own until 1949 when Diamond Bus Lines began. A privately-owned company based in Edmonton, Diamond served routes within Jasper Place itself as well as service to the Union Bus Depot in Edmonton's downtown.

While Diamond began with two buses, the company added a third bus to accommodate an additional 41 passengers in 1950 **2**. According to Diamond's manager Cecil Bradshaw, it was the largest bus operating in or out of Edmonton at the time **3**. Then, in 1953, Diamond started a rush hour service between the residential and shopping districts of JP, while also increasing the number of trips into Edmonton **4**.

Jon's father-in-law took the first bus to work each morning from Jasper Place to 66 Street and what is now the Yellowhead area. "It was a very tight transfer that he had to make to be at work on time. Of course, the bus was late one morning and he missed his transfer, which made him 5-10 minutes late for work. His boss refused to pay

him for the first hour, so he refused to work the rest of that first hour. For that, he was banished to the graveyard shift."

Tony used to catch the Diamond bus on 151 Street and 92 Avenue to connect with the Number 1 trolley bus at the turnabout at 149 Street. "[I] often had to go downtown with my mom for shopping and medical appointments. There were no malls at the time, nor peripheral medical centres. Everything was downtown."

In an interview for the Jasper Place Community History Project, former resident Chrystia Chomiak recalls Edmonton's public transit system being more efficient and cleaner than JP's. "In Edmonton you had real sidewalks, you had electric trolleys, and you had paved roads with real sidewalks. In Jasper Place you had wooden sidewalks, you had gravel roads, so in the muddy season if we caught the Diamond bus we'd go out in our rubber boots and get on with them, because you couldn't walk in your shoes," she says. "We had bags, and we'd put our boots in the bag and change into our shoes. The Edmonton system was much better. It was cleaner and more often," Chomiak adds.

Ernie has similar memories of the challenges posed by the unpaved roads. "The true nature of the roads came through when it rained; they became slick and then rutted in clay. Many passengers of the bus lines came home muddied and bruised from pushing the bus out of the mud and back towards Stony Plain Road," he recalls.

Diamond Bus Lines resisted efforts by workers to unionize, often firing workers who were trying to organize **5**. Ultimately, Diamond stopped running its Jasper Place service in August of 1964, just shortly before Jasper Place amalgamated with Edmonton **6**. Edmonton Transit Service (ETS) took over the bus services in Jasper Place in 1964, following amalgamation **7**. With the aid

of subsidies Diamond continued running buses to Sherwood Park and the surrounding refineries, but shut down completely in the late '60s due to financial pressure **8**.

In our third and final part of "Getting Around in Jasper Place," we will examine the history of Barrel Taxi.

## Resilience and Diversity Depend on Investment



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As MLAs representing the area, we are always excited to see the resilience and growth of businesses along Stony Plain Road. The diversity of businesses present, makes Stony Plain Road and Area a shopping destination. You may decide to go to Kunitz to buy a pair of shoes because you heard about the new Alberta Woodland Creature pattern by illustrator, Jason Blower. While in the area, it's been a while since you've stopped into Ben's Meats and Deli for some delicious

cheese. Perhaps you head to Variant Edition to check out graphic novels in their new arrivals section. Or maybe, you visit Apache Seeds Limited to add a touch of green to your home. No matter how you spend your time on Stony

Plain Road, this diversity of businesses makes it a fun place to frequent.

Another area in which diversity is important is in Alberta's energy sector. We all need affordable energy and making sure we have diversified supply is the responsible thing to do. We can have a strong oil and gas industry as well as renewables. In fact, Alberta was leading Canada in renewables growth, and creating good paying jobs while doing so. That is until the UCP put a moratorium on renewable energy, which is putting \$33 billion in investment and 24,000 jobs at risk. We believe this decision must be reversed immediately, before Alberta jobs and our economic future suffer long-term consequences.

These investment and job loss figures come from detailed analysis conducted by the Pembina Institute. They found that 118 projects under various stages of development are at risk due to the moratorium. The projects span the province, from Alberta's southern border to as far north as Peace River. The companies and organizations developing these projects are just as diverse and range from a First Nation to longtime renewable energy companies to municipalities, to an established oil and

gas company.

This moratorium is also impacting Alberta families who are facing record-high electricity prices, significantly higher than anywhere else in Canada. Rather than presenting solutions to lower cost, Danielle Smith and the UCP are limiting opportunities for landowners, businesses and all of us using electricity.

We're also investing \$3.7 Million to enhance and support Edmonton's vibrant tourism economy.


These are just a few of the results we have delivered this year, and we will continue to deliver as we head into the Fall session in the House of Commons.

# New Mustard Seed Location Emphasizes Complexities of Social Disorder

The Mustard Seed Community Impact Center is now sharing a space with two local churches at Fusion Centre (101 Avenue and 153 Street), a few blocks away from their former location at the Christian Care Center on 150 Street. This has resulted in new neighbours, some of whom are experiencing elements of social disorder that has arrived in the vicinity. *SPANN* reached out to the Mustard Seed to learn more about the complexities of this situation.

Carmen manages the newly relocated Impact Centre, which has a large common area, kitchen, and a flex room used for storage, course work, and as a first aid station. The site shares a single bathroom on the premises. Lunch is held each Tuesday from 12-2, with a brunch service served Wednesday through Friday. Afterwards, patrons can only remain for activities scheduled on site (such as Bingo), or actively engaged in self work or other tasks, such as time-sensitive applications for income support and other services.

Carmen outlines how preconceived notions, bias, and emotions of frustration are often at the heart of arguments or accusations involving clients. They may be perceived as loitering outside when in fact they may be waiting for a service while keeping an eye on their bicycle, being unable to afford a lock. Individuals who

do cause problems in the area are often not clients, or, are new to the area and have yet to forge a relationship with the Mustard Seed and expectations, stresses these relationships help establish better behaviour.

Todd Janes, Executive director of SPRBA notes that the services provided by The Mustard Seed are important as the Impact Centre offers a site where individuals connect with services, and is the only agency providing this work with the recent closure of the Jasper Place Wellness Centre. Individuals need a point of contact and support, and The Mustard Seed has stepped up. Like any business, there are expectations around line up controls and keeping their site clean.

Kris Knutson, Senior Director for The Mustard Seeds' Community Impact Centres, echoes Thomas' observations. Connecting with the Mustard Seed, and mutual exploration of pathways to work together, allows individuals to feel valued and a part of their community. Through this sense of value, they grow to respect the help being offered, and are more willing to speak up when others act out in a manner that contributes negatively to their collective reputation.

It's also important to note that The Mustard Seed is limited in what it can do for the offsite actions

of some clients, as they are not wards of the organization.

However, services can and have been declined as a means of establishing expectations.

Kris emphasizes that individuals on the street did not grow up with the goal of becoming addicts or without housing. Substance abuse is mostly correlated with the suppression of extreme traumas, with many individuals sharing painful stories and experiences that have led them to where they are today. This trauma, and the actions to suppress it, often lead others to the assumption that individuals don't want something more of their lives.

With a recent increase in police presence in the downtown core, the social disorder typically clustered there has spread across Edmonton, emphasizing the lack of proper programs and funding to accommodate the complex problems associated with homelessness. With approximately 70% of its clients "sleeping rough", and that same population doubling during the COVID pandemic, the center has gone from serving 50-60 people to close to 150, illustrating the gap in services and funding to address the problem - A bandaid put across a large open wound.

# Resiliency & New Growth Along Stony Plain Road

Long known as a shopping destination, it's no secret that Stony Plain Road is in for big changes. The Valley Line West LRT extension will link the downtown core to the Misericordia Hospital, West Edmonton Mall, and Lewis Estates west of the Anthony Henday; with three stations in the area located at 142nd, 149th, and 156th street. The roads' current state, however, is not what it used to be, with construction impacting traffic along the corridor for its second year. Work on the southern (eastbound) lanes of the road and its sidewalk has progressed slowly for various reasons, while walls of fencing impede visibility and discourage foot traffic for the area in general.

Despite these challenges, local business owners are working hard to serve their local customers and persevere through this extended period of construction, which directly follows the heels of the COVID-19 pandemic. New businesses are also setting up shop in the area, drawn to the area's proximity and the customer traffic it traditionally caters to. With the promise of a future LRT route cutting through half of the business improvement district, there are high hopes for a bustling commercial corridor that encourages development and density along the route.

**SPANN** reached out to a number of local business owners, both along and offside the path of construction, to get a better idea of what businesses are looking forward to in the future, the struggles they face in the interim, and how they are managing a complex set of variables.

#### **Enduring Today For A Brighter Tomorrow**

Susan owns the newly opened Capital Second Hand, located in the former Blue Jar Antiques space at 15230 Stony Plain Rd, and is no stranger to the area: Her father owns West End Exchange, which has been in the area since 1993. Located directly in the epicentre of construction at the moment, business has been slow, as there are customers navigating the streets with the imposition of construction. She's frustrated with the seeming slow pace - Last year, work abruptly stopped in the fall, and did not pick up until spring the following season, and this year not much progress seems to have been made. As a business owner, any delays in construction simply mean an increase to the period where her customers are impeded, and additional stress on her own bottom line.

Marian, owner of The Gilded Rabbit Art & Framing located at 10104 149 St, has similar concerns. She purchased the business from its previous owners in 2018, fully aware of the upcoming LRT project, only to have COVID hit in 2020. Additionally, timelines for the project have extended past their original dates. She, like many business owners, are still paying back business pandemic loans, and current construction impacts are an additional factor to contend with. She's watching how construction is progressing on the south side of the street knowing work will eventually switch to the north side (in 2024).

# "Adaptation is a mindset we need to have"

A block east at Ch. Cafeteria on 14802 Stony Plain Rd, owner Nadia watches with anticipation - The MacKinnon Ravine pedestrian bridge, traditionally an anchor connection to the residential area of Crestwood south of her cafe, has been torn down since 2022 in tandem with the LRT project. While she's excited that its replacement is coming next year, she, like Marian, knows that her true test with LRT construction has yet to come. "Adaptation is a mindset we need to have," she says, "You can't stop this development, cities grow." In the meantime she's "counting pennies" to be safe, but remains optimistic about the future and the broader changes coming to Stony Plain Road.

#### **Finding Ways To Pivot**

For some business owners along the route, LRT construction has not necessarily impacted them the same way. Kareema at Neo Juicery, located in Revolution Square at 10062 151 St NW, outlines that in a customer survey in October 2022, some 40% advised that construction was the primary contributor preventing them from visiting the store. While sales were laggard that summer, 2023 has proven anything but - Traffic has increased. That can't be attributed to the LRT, but she also recognizes that their home delivery service offers value to their customer base. They've also offset losses by increasing their presence at various pop-up markets across the city, growing their customer base and revenue. She's motivated to be distinguished by the value of her services, and contribute to the future of Stony Plain Road during and after construction - She's encouraged with new shops such as King of Tarts, also in Revolution Square at 10051 152 St NW, and the diversity such shops bring for shared consumers.

Cafe Rista, located at 14213 103 Ave NW in the Westgrove Professional Building, is owned by Simon. Open since 2010, he welcomes the LRT to the area, recognizing it as a critical piece of infrastructure that will allow the corridor to become a shopping district similar to 124th Street. "If you haven't had the word 'pivot' tattooed in your brain after COVID, now is the time" he says. "Mass transit is essential to the growth of the city; we have to adapt and plan for the future". Simon believes that the city plan for the area can be successfully implemented. "I can't fight it [construction], I have to work with it." He makes a point of canvassing when construction is busy, handing out his card, ensuring workers are aware they can grab a bite and coffee at his shop for lunch. While he has a preference for small independent businesses, he recognizes the presence of new franchises in the area as a positive indicator that redevelopment initiatives have been successful so far - We built it, and they came.

Hifa would agree. Owner and operator of El Corazon YEG, another West Block business located at #150 - 14101 West Block Dr NW, Hifa sees an evolution taking place in the area.

Over the last five years, the variety of businesses catering to the community has expanded, bringing in more shopper traffic as a result. With an increase in destination businesses that cater to specific needs, she only sees more shops popping up that complement the existing ones around them, creating an experience. She envisions people enjoying dinner at El Corazon, stopping at the nearby Leopard Pizza for craft beer afterwards, and perhaps finishing off the evening at Square 1 Coffee. On this note, she emphasises the importance of support and collaboration with other businesses; that their presence contributes to the area, the choices available, and the willingness of customers to return and explore. With the LRT in mind, she sees positive benefits for the business community when it is working together.

#### **SPR Still Attracting New Businesses**

Angel owns Preddy's Angel Hair and Beauty Supply, located at 15209 Stony Plain Rd; surrounded by construction. She finds communicating the traffic detours are the biggest hassle, which was made apparent during our interview when a customer arrived for an appointment and exclaimed the trouble they had determining where to park. She's appreciative that Marigold has installed signage along 100 Avenue directing customers up 152 Street to her shop. Having already established a successful business in Brampton, Ontario, she opened this location in January of 2023. She credits a friend with comparing the area to Queens Street, which piqued her interest, and the great landlord and affordable rental rates at her current location sealed the deal. Today she has an established and loyal customer base, producing over twenty different homemade hair and body products. Her success lies in part to the culturally diverse neighbourhood with varying needs, and she hopes to expand her location and staff in the near future, believing that the LRT will bring even more residents and diversity.

TwinFlower Studio, located at 14716 Stony Plain Rd, is owned by Nicola. Having always wanted to run a flower shop at an early age, and already looking for a brick-and-mortar shop to expand her home business, she jumped at the opportunity to purchase the previous site of Yans Flowers in early 2023. "The Yans opportunity, it had it all - parking, located in a stripmall with other destination businesses, along a busy street in a central neighbourhood with visual impact," she says. Being new to the street, she hasn't much of a basis to judge the impact of LRT construction on her doorstep, but also recognizes that she spends a considerable amount of time and effort on online marketing, while ensuring her services are available for order and delivery with services like Skip The Dishes and Uber. She's looking forward to when the LRT is complete, bringing a sense of calm and normality to the area, which will simply encourage more people to explore the area.

Jonathan owns Square 1 Coffee. Located at #140 - 14055 West Block Dr in the new West Block Glenora mixed use district, he saw the opportunity in setting up shop along Stony Plain Road - multiple businesses surrounded by a large established residential community, with more development planned. West Block is a preview of the SPR corridor becoming more walkable, especially once LRT construction is complete and additional development takes place at other street corners along the route. Where coffee shops are typically busier in the winter, that has proven to be the opposite during the summer of 2023 at his location. He attributes West Blocks' design and accessibility as contributing to the increase in activity. He also recognizes the brand name of the area and the word of mouth that accompanies it.

#### Off The Tracks

While businesses west of 156th Street may not be as impacted by construction, many still look forward to the future benefits for the area LRT will bring. Noni owns Ritualistics, a body piercing and tattoo shop located at 15804 Stony Plain Rd. While she has had some minor disruptions to traffic flows, the majority of her clients are not having problems arriving on time for their appointments. She's looking forward to a prettier, more visually appealing street in both shape and form that will help enhance the character of the area. At One Stop Biker Shop (10007 167 St NW), manager Angela surmises that once the project is completed, they will see a permanent increase of eastbound traffic on 100 Avenue, which would only be a positive for them.

Michael and Jodene at nearby Authentic Dungeons, a role playing game cafe at 10041 166 St NW, welcome the LRT. They know it will offer another option for their regular customers who rely on mass transit, some of whom travel all the way from St. Albert to book a game room with friends. At The Chopped Leaf (114 Mayfield Common Northwest), owner Colleen recognizes that despite the route not passing her location, it will probably contribute to more people travelling to the general area, which compounds the chances that new developments and increased density will follow. This simply means more customers, and more opportunities to connect with new neighbouring businesses that contribute to the variety those customers enjoy.

#### Supporting Stony Plain Road Today

Stony Plain Road and its business community has a long history. As part of the former Town of Jasper Place, it enticed past Edmontonians with the lure of late-night shopping options, and has seen many evolutions since its amalgamation by the city in 1964. The Valley Line West LRT is the latest of these evolutions, and while there are growing pains, local businesses are doing their best to remain visible and contribute to the continued vibrancy of the area. With this in mind, remember to show them some love, and make an effort to support them during this time of change!

MARIAN at *The Gilded Rabbit Art and Framing*, located at 10104 149 St NW. She knows many businesses are still recovering from the pandemic, and LRT construction is yet another obstacle.


